


What I'm Reading: Karolina's Twins

I just finished up the audio book [Karolina's Twins: A Novel](#) by Ronald H. Balson. I snapped up the audio book when I saw it was by the same author who wrote another book I enjoyed, [Once We Were Brothers](#).



I very much enjoyed the first book I listened to and really hoped I would enjoy this one as well. The same lawyer/private detective team works in both of the books to help Jewish Holocaust survivors right a wrong that happened during the occupation of their countries. The premise works really well.
